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
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# A Passion for Culinary Arts

As the lead Baking Instructor, Chef Jennifer Guerra began working at South Texas College in the spring of 2012. Since then she has been responsible for the graduation growth in the baking program from 1 graduate in the first year to 25 graduates for the 2014-2015 academic year. In order to promote and grow the program, Chef Jennifer and her colleagues host a Culinary Wars event which is a week of various culinary competitions including pastry, cake decorating, Iron Chef, Chopped, and Perfect Bite. By participating in Culinary Wars, students are able to showcase their talents and build up their confidence.

Moreover, Chef Jennifer's passion for culinary is evident in everything she completes. Her students see her passion and are more invested in their education as a result. Dedicated to improving the whole student experience, Chef Jennifer works to evolve her lectures each semester. Recently, she added an assignment called "Reflections" where she asks her students to reflect on their performance in the lab, analyzing their product results. If a product

does not turn out, then she will guide them to find out why they were not successful. The students find the reason and learn from their failed attempts. By reflecting on their mistakes, students have the opportunity to learn and grow. Additionally, Chef Jennifer has her students maintain blogs so they can share their experiences with other classmates. The students' willingness to put forth this level of effort testifies to the respect and appreciation they have for Chef Jennifer. By giving her all every day and loving her work, Chef Jennifer serves as an inspiration for her students.

Chef Jennifer is also dedicated to our community, as she offers free, monthly health cooking classes which are open to the public. With the ever-increasing obesity epidemic, Chef Jennifer strives to teach community members about healthy eating through quick cooking demonstrations. Through these classes, participants are able to see that healthy cooking can be fast, simple, and flavorful. Because of her service to the department, her students, and the community, Chef Jennifer is a very valuable asset.

For Art Instructor Chris Leonard, giving students professional experience in the sometimes nebulous world of art and providing greater exposure and opportunities to build artistic proficiency is of the utmost importance. Chris provides these opportunities for his students through exhibits both on and off the college campus. For instance, Chris assists with the annual South Texas Ceramic Showdown at STC's Library Art Gallery each summer. This exhibit offers students the chance to collaborate and show artwork alongside peers from schools both in and outside of Texas. Additionally, Chris continues to select student and community work for display at a local, art-friendly restaurant, the Blue Onion.

In the same manner, Chris is a member of the Upper Valley Art League, and he serves as the advisor for the South Texas Clay Club. The Clay Club, under Chris' advisement, has participated in the McAllen Art Walk for the past several years with a showing at McAllen Stained Glass. At these events, students host throwing demonstrations and offer sparkling fine art selections from STC's kiln.

Furthermore, Chris leads by example and shows artwork in various venues locally, regionally, and nationally. While teaching at STC, his work has been included in a number of juried shows on a regional and national level. Thus, during the spring semester of 2015, The University of Dallas Regional Competition included his work Two Two-Sided Texas Tommies. This piece also received an Award of Merit from Juror Eva Kwong of Kent State University. Additionally, Chris has works on display at the Baltimore Clayworks in the exhibit Putting the Pieces Together, An Exhibition to Address what is Broken (curated by Sarah McCann). As an educator, Chris serves as a developer of talent, and as a result, each semester Chris provides opportunities indicating a wealth of examples of our students' abilities and talents. These opportunities also showcase and expose our college to the community. Chris furnishes students with professional experience, greater exposure, and development of artistic proficiency. He also provides the community an enhanced view of practicing and emerging artists, showcasing our community responsibility as a college.



# Modeling Excellence: A Passion for Learning and Teaching

Having been with the college for over thirteen years, Dr. Rebecca Millán's drive to innovate, learn, and contribute only becomes stronger with each passing year. Dr. Millán offers a profound and inspiring example of a professor who embodies the value of learning, and who integrates that learning into effective college service and classroom instruction that bridges the disciplinary divide.

During her time at STC, Dr. Millán has earned three new degrees: a master's degree in Sociology, a doctoral degree in educational leadership, and most recently, an associate's degree in graphic arts. These degrees demonstrate her personal commitment to the belief that education is innately valuable and ongoing—a belief that is central to the mission of the entire field of higher education. She does not merely promote learning as a classroom instructor; she lives it as a person. Dr. Millán understands that learning does not exist best in isolation, but rather only thrives fully when its place in the vast web of interconnected fields of study is understood.

This same focus on the larger picture is manifest in her college

service. Hence, Dr. Millán is one of the founders of Sigma Kappa Delta, the English Honors Society. She chaired the English Retention and Advising Committee for many years and has been extensively involved in the ongoing process of advising English majors. Moreover, she was instrumental not only in designing and teaching the new online competency-based English courses for BAT majors, but in developing the standards by which all future classes of this type will be taught.

Dr. Millán models this belief in learning and passion for education as a whole in her classroom, creating an environment in which students are exposed to the profound, but often ignored, connections between disciplines. Dr. Millán's broad base of learning allows her to show students that the learning one experiences in any class is of value in every class. She can connect artistic creation to art history to sociology to writing, and then tie all of it into the curriculum requirements of South Texas College. She helps the college graduate not merely students, but deep thinkers and lifelong learners.



# A Devoted Advocate

As a dedicated faculty member, Developmental Mathematics Instructor Merrie Van Loy began working for the college in 1995 and has since taught College Algebra, Introduction to Computer Science, and all levels of Developmental Mathematics. During her tenure at STC, she has been a very active member of the Faculty Senate and the South Texas Faculty Association.

As an educator, Merrie was a devoted advocate for her students, realizing that many of them need more personalized help and instruction. Thus, Merrie spent countless hours in the CLE, tutoring math. She offered personal tutoring and assistance for dozens of her students, knowing that sometimes a special need or personal problem could prevent them from being successful in class.

Retiring at the end of the 2014/2015 academic year, Merrie has had a positive and profound impact on the school, as she co-

authored a computer science grant that was worth nearly a million dollars to the college. Additionally, she created the current final exam schedule, providing a simplified, organized timeline for exams. In the same manner, Merrie has worked tirelessly with the Faculty Senate, including ten years during which she helped create, maintain, and present the annual faculty salary chart. Merrie served as an officer of the South Texas Faculty Association for years and continued to remain active even after retiring as an officer.

As she moves into retirement, Merrie continues to be active in her community, as she provides forwarding address labels for Winter Texas whose mail must be sent back north each year. She also currently serves as the "Calendar Chairperson," responsible for creating, scheduling, and maintaining all recreational activities in her retirement park. Merrie will be greatly missed at South Texas College.

#### Teaching with Enthusiasm

As Chair of the Radiologic Technology Program, Crystal Bird received her BS in Radiologic Science from Midwestern State University and her MA in Educational Leadership from Trident University. She is also a licensed technologist in both radiology and mammography. Crystal joined South Texas College in 2001, and her experience includes teaching all courses in the radiologic discipline and includes the development of the first Mammography Certification Program in the Rio Grande Valley. Currently, she is expanding the Radiologic Technology Program to include certification in CT, MRI, and Diagnostic Medical Sonography.

In the classroom, Crystal has a unique way of engaging the students' attention in every lecture by transmitting energy and enthusiasm to them. Her energetic teaching style and love for the material is contagious, and students quickly become engaged in the subject matter themselves. Crystal serves as a facilitator in the classroom, believing that students learn better by doing than watching. In one instance, Crystal has her students complete a National Radiologic Technology Week (NRTW) Project in her Radiographic Imaging Equipment course. In celebration of NRTW and their profession, Crystal has students work in groups to prepare display boards which showcase their knowledge of radiology. The students then present their research and boards to the NAH community in a public forum. From these projects, Crystal hopes that her students take with them a sense of pride in themselves for all of the hard work and dedication it takes to pursue their dreams. She also hopes that they realize the significance of their efforts in improving the quality of life for themselves, their families, and the members of our community.

# LYUDMYLA DICKINSON ECONOMICS



# **Using Art and Design to Teach Economics**

Originally from the Ukraine, Lyudmyla Dickinson has experienced the results of a variety of economic policies in a way that many students in the United States have not. Having personally experienced communism, inflation, deficit, stagflation, unemployment, and many other economic conditions, Lyudmyla is able to bring these experiences to her students and make the economic theories come alive as a result.

With a master's in Economics from Chernivtsi State University and a diploma in Multimedia Design from the New Image College of Design and Technology Inc., business and art have always been part of Lyudmyla's life. Thus, she uses art and design in order to engage her students and help them gain a better understanding of economics. For instance, one assignment features the negative effects of credit cards. For this assignment, Lyudmyla has her students create a flyer on the negative effects of credit cards, and then they must share the information with their peers outside the class. This activity motivates students and helps them demonstrate a deeper understanding of the economic concepts and consequences as well as the responsibility of using credit cards. Most recently, Lyudmyla had her students design a brochure titled "How to Become an Entrepreneur." Lyudmyla believes that "when an instructor is truly passionate about teaching, students can sense the enthusiasm, forward-thinking and positive energy that a teacher brings." Additionally, she feels that "work with passion can, and does change lives," and she always tries to model this behavior with her students that they too may become successful.



# DAVID FREEMAN VISUAL ARTS

#### Art: A Tool for Social Awareness

Demonstrating to his students that art can be used as an instrument for social awareness, David Freeman creates hands-on learning experiences that allow students to utilize visual images to impact community awareness. As part of his public art billboards assignment, students create billboard displays with socially conscious themes that combine fine art, graphic design, and photographic images. David has forged partnerships with local billboard owners to showcase student work. They have created displays on such topics as public health (smoking, drunk driving, obesity), education (student retention and success), and controlling the pet population. Students gain valuable design skills while also performing a service to the community. The billboard assignment is a great way for students to experience a creative involvement while fabricating skills that will help them succeed in life.

The assignment also allows participants to develop their math skills - particularly in the area of fractions and teaches the principles and elements of design. The assignment teaches how the photographic arts can empower students, promoting the arts and building their careers. This assignment readily ties into other disciplines such as Philosophy, History, and Ethics and advances the institution's goals as it positively engages the students and enriches our community.



# MIGUEL GARCIA BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

# Mixing it Up and Making It Fun!

Associate Professor Miguel Garcia has been with South Texas College's Business Administration Department for over 18 years. Prior to coming to STC, Miguel worked as a Certified Public Accountant, and he continues to serve clients in the McAllen area.

In order to deliver effective instruction and have students take their learning seriously, Miguel has customized his teaching techniques. While he wants his students to be diligent and take their studies seriously, he also wants them to have fun at the same time. Thus, he teaches by "making it fun," rather than stressing that it is accounting or another business course. For instance, Miguel often starts his lectures with an engaging two-minute activity where the students must read and comment on an article, video, or another work related to the lecture's theme.

In order to engage his students and make the lessons fun, Miguel integrates theory and accounting practice. Hence, he often has contests where he gives out prizes or bonus points on the next exam. Miguel also brings his CPA experiences to the classroom by sharing real-life accounting situations and applications. Miguel observes how strongly students engage with the material when they have the opportunity to learn about how it applies in real-life situations. Similarly, Miguel feels that student motivation is crucial for student learning. Hence, he takes the time to learn every student's name and shows he cares about them by soliciting their feedback through surveys and polls. Then he finds ways to inspire them on their paths.

# NICHOLAS GUTIERREZ COMPUTER SCIENCE

# **Employing Robotics to Teach Programming**

Nicolas H. Gutierrez recognizes that programming is a challenging subject for the majority of the students to learn, and at some point, the students must be reminded that programming can also be fun and deeply rewarding. Thus, Nicolas strives to consistently challenge and engage students through the use of robotics. In his second C++ course, Nicolas introduces his students to robotics and teaches them to program the robots.

However, programming the robots to move is not enough. By presenting their students with a goal and some competition, the students worked harder to achieve a goal. The goal is to program the robot to perform better than the other students' robot in a series of challenges. Thus, Nicolas asks students to complete three challenges including a maze, race, and sumo. In the maze, students are to program the robot so it can travel through an unknown maze in the shortest amount of time. In the second challenge of a race, students start on one side of the room and must reach the other side the quickest, avoiding any obstacles in the path. For the final Sumo challenge, two robots begin in the center of a circle with the goal of pushing the other robot out of the circle. The two robots are programmed with a strategy to win, so coming up with a creative counter strategy is also a challenge. Through the competition, students are able to see a positive, realistic application for the information they are learning.



# RICARDO OLIVARES HUMAN RESOURCES

# Performance Management

Ricardo Olivares joined STC in the Partnership/Continuing Education area in January 2006. In 2007, he transferred to the Institute for Advanced Manufacturing, and, in fall 2013, he joined the Human Resource Department. Additionally, Ricardo is an US Army Veteran retiring with the rank of First Sergeant. Ricardo's teaching philosophy is to maintain a positive attitude with all his students and to show his students that he is there for the sole purpose of their success. He believes the greatest strength that an instructor has is "performance management." Like a business environment, an instructor, like any good leader, must know his students. Ricardo knows that each student is different and learns in different ways. As a result, he gets to know his students through classroom interaction. Most importantly, Ricardo understands that the instructor must be caring and responsible, as there is a direct correlation between student aptitude and instructor attitude. In summation, he feels that "if the instructor is engaged with their students, learning becomes easy and fun."

Application is also part of Ricardo's teaching strategy. For instance, in his HR Training and Development class, students are required to design human resource training processes, engaging in a semester long project that requires multiple modules to the end product. The students must provide a training plan, execution of the training, activities, PowerPoints, quizzes, and exams, as if the student were an HR professional working in the training department. Through these philosophies and assignments, Ricardo provides his students with practical experience and the confidence they need to execute such processes.



### Enhancing Student Learning of Anatomical Structures Using Digital Photography

Dr. Edwin Tamayo has been a member of STC's Biology Department since May 2006. Prior to coming to the U.S. in 2005, he taught Human Anatomy and Physiology, basic and advanced courses in Genetics, Biochemistry, and graduate research for 18 years in the Philippines. His years of teaching reflect his dedication to shaping the minds and the future of the youth. Furthermore, Dr. Tamayo studied and published the genetic, diet, and lifestyle factors of cardiovascular diseases, cancer, and diabetes, and he has certifications in Food, Health and Nutrition, and a leadership certification in Complete Health Improvement Program (CHIP).

In the classroom, Dr. Tamayo recognizes that students studying Human Anatomy and Physiology often find it overwhelming to identify and memorize an enormous amount of anatomical structures and their details within the limited number of laboratory sessions for each laboratory exercise. Since digital and computer technology has become readily available for student use, Dr. Tamayo has integrated digital photography to enhance learning of anatomical structures. Thus, he has students work in groups to take pictures of actual laboratory models of gross anatomical structures and microscope slides of specimens for microscopic anatomical structures using their own digital devices. Afterwards, the students evaluate and label their pictures by comparing them with the figures in their laboratory manual. The completed labelled pictures serve as review materials for students in preparation for their laboratory practicals and quizzes. They will then be compiled as the students' laboratory portfolio to be turned-in for a grade by the end of the semester. Dr. Tamayo's students have shown significant improvements in successful completion rates since he implemented this technique.

# DIANE TETER BIOLOGY

# Contextualizing Biology through Hands-On Projects

Many students find biology to be one of the more challenging courses within the core curriculum, yet a holistic approach that makes the content relevant to students' lives can improve their success. Associate Professor Diane Teter understands that by creating a tangible connection between students' day-to-day lives and the complex subject matter of biology, she can most effectively ensure student learning. In order to ignite interest in biology, Diane has designed a multi-faceted semester project in which students create a written report on their choice of the following topics: nutrition (diet and exercise), gardening, aquariums, terrariums, or a topic of their choosing with instructor approval. Students must then write a 4-5 page report, incorporating tables, graphs, and journals in an academic writing format. All of the projects must include data collection, analysis, and application which satisfy the higher-level core objectives of critical thinking, empirical/quantitative skills in addition to teamwork and communication utilized in discussion forums.

The final semester project demonstrates the biology concept of the scientific method, which contains the steps of observation, hypothesis, experiment, use of data and/or observations, and conclusion; all of which can lead to a theory. Thus, not only do the students learn, but also the core objectives are fulfilled, and biology becomes personal and relevant in the students' everyday lives.





# Preparing Students for the Demands of Healthcare Programs and Professions

Wayne Williams, a Vancouverite, has lived in McAllen since 1993 with his wife, Chelan, also a South Texas College healthcare educator. He has been a counselor, instructor, and program chair at South Texas College for over eighteen years and is passionate about student success and preparing today's students for demanding healthcare programs. Thus, he has helped develop the College Success for Healthcare course (CSFH) that provides timely, specific, accurate, didactic, and experiential curriculum to self-declared healthcare students.

Since inception in the spring 2009 semester from just a single class with 12 students to the current 55 sections annually, over 5,000 five thousand students have taken the course College Success for Healthcare. In this course, College Success Instructor Wayne Williams and his colleagues introduce potential healthcare students to all eleven healthcare professions at STC. While they may already have a particular direction in mind, this presentation provides them with a stronger understanding and foundation for making decisions about educational choices, and many often discover new and more appropriate professions. These presentations are coordinated with program chairs and instructors in the eleven programs and afterward include students who are already in the NAH program. This program provides students with a particular reality to the time commitment and rigorous expectations of healthcare education and the profession. The affective domain and corrective development in the students' minds strengthens them as they prepare six-nine-twelve months before entering a healthcare program at STC.



# DR. MENG-HUNG WU COMPUTER AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

# Challenging Programming Students through Mobile Application Design

In the classroom, Dr. Meng-Hung Wu strives to inspire, guide, and challenge his students while maximizing their critical thinking skills. In his Special Topics course, he focuses on the popular task of iOS (iPhone, iPad, etc.) programming. Dr. Wu teaches students that in order to write a great application (app) that has the potential to generate revenue, one must start with a good idea. Dr. Wu helps spark students' initial ideas for their iOS development project by introducing popular apps in the market.

No matter what type of app is created, there are a few fundamental design patterns and techniques that Dr. Wu presents to the students before they may begin to write the code. This guidance is instrumental in order for students to create successful apps.

In addition to inspiring and engaging students by having them select a project topic that matches their interests, Dr. Wu also challenges the students to think critically. Apple supports iOS development using various programming languages and platforms, so the students are challenged to use the programming skills acquired from previous courses they have taken.

In order to continue to provide excellence in his teaching, Dr. Wu keeps up with the most current technology in the computer programming field. Recently, he attended the 2014 Game Developers Conference, which is the world's largest, and longest-running professionals-only game developer event. Through his continuing professional development and innovative approach to teaching, Dr. Wu offers students the opportunity to take engaging classes that not only interest them, but also benefit them professionally.

# ROBERT SEAN KENNEDY HISTORY

# eFaculty of the Year

Robert Sean Kennedy has served as a faculty member in the History Department since fall 2007. During the last five years, Sean has demonstrated his passion for teaching online through a true commitment to innovation and excellence that drives online learning. He has implemented various techniques that allow for greater student engagement. One of these techniques allows him to flip his class by creating and posting video lectures online. By offering the video lectures online, Sean is able to reserve class time for working on the essay questions associated with the lectures, both in groups and individually. In class, students break into groups utilizing the white boards responding to components of the lecture essays. This approach allows Sean to see who is prepared and who is not --well before any type of exam. Furthermore, students who are prepared have the opportunity to help those that are not as prepared during class, which greatly reinforces those students' understanding of the subject matter. Since class time is quite active, students are able to retain and internalize the subject matter more by employing episodic memory. As a result, most students are prepared and successful. Sean explains, "It is heartwarming to witness thirty plus students arrive for the exam and leave the exam endowed with confidence."


Additionally, in his online course, Sean makes himself available to the students by hosting google hangout sessions twice a week. He typically offers these sessions in the late evening in order to accommodate students' outside work and family obligations. During these sessions Sean fields questions concerning content and course expectations that students may be more successful in the course. Sean takes great care in the design of his course, working closely with the Distance Education staff, to ensure that his courses offer the best learning experience for his students.



# Faculty of the Year

Rene Zuniga is currently the Chair of the College Success and Education Departments at South Texas College. His profound passion for service has led him to be involved with multiple committees and participate in numerous student activities. Since joining STC, he has served on the Curriculum Committee, President's Faculty Advisory Committee, and Faculty Senate, to name a few. Rene has also represented the Office of Professional and Organizational Development by facilitating the Teaching and Learning Academy and co-facilitating the FOCUS Academy. He often presents on classroom management techniques for faculty in multiple departments and divisions.

In the classroom, Rene utilizes an innovative style of teaching which allows him to incorporate mobile technologies in order to engage his students in multisensory, multidimensional, and multi-interactive learning experiences. # RICHARD LUBBEN ART




